Approximately 80 million years ago, marine reptiles swam the inland sea that covered South Dakota and left a rich fossil record behind. James Martin Ph.D., executive curator of the South Dakota School of Mines and Technology's Museum of geology, has excavated hundreds of these creatures during his more than 30 years in the field. This fall, he excavated another that ranks top of his list.

“This specimen represents the best preserved mosasaur I’ve seen in 20 years and is a credit to state and federal cooperation.” Martin said.

Six years ago, Martin recovered a huge mosasaur- a giant, air-breathing marine lizard from the Missouri River bluffs near Chamberlain, South Dakota. While in the field this fall, he and his team, in collaboration with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. Made a return trip to the area, where the proverbial lightning struck twice. In the Pierre Shale Group, directly above the previous excavation site, an incredibly well-preserved plioplatecarpine mosasaur was found by James Lindley of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. Fossil vertebrates such as this reptile are public property and require a federal collecting permit for removal.

Clustered around the fossil, Martin and his team gently culled through layers of shale to uncover the specimen, literally sifting through the fossil record. As they uncovered the skull, the jaws slowly appeared, studded with teeth-razor sharp in life and still menacing 80 million years after death. According to Martin, the skull is just one reason the 10-foot specimen is a rare find. It is uncommon to find a mosasaur of this size that is fully articulated, still retains its skull and even the soft tissue preserved. The other piece that elevates this specimen from the ordinary is that the creature still contained remains of its last supper.

Now removed from the field, the specimen is being prepped, studied, and will be displayed in the new Paleontology Research Laboratory.

NOVEMBER BIRTHSTONE:



November's gemstone, Citrine, is as warm as a Van Gogh painting of sunflowers. The name Citrine comes from an old French word, "citrin", meaning lemon. One of the more rare forms of quartz, this gemstone ranges in color from the palest yellow to a dark amber named Madeira because of its resemblance to the red wine.

Perhaps because of its scarcity, there is little mention of Citrine used as a gemstone prior to the first century B.C. The Romans were thought to be the first to wear the yellow quartz, crafting it into cabochon, or highly polished but uncut facets of stone set into jewelry. Citrine became more popular during the Romantic Period, when artisans often favored these warm colored gems to enhance gold jewelry. Citrine, like all forms of quartz, was believed to have magical powers and was worn as a talisman against evil thoughts and snake venom. It was also considered to have medicinal properties and was commonly used as a remedy for urinary and kidney ailments.

Sister stone to the purple quartz known as Amethyst, Citrine crystals are found in igneous metamorphic and sedimentary rocks. It is believed that some Citrine may have actually begun as Amethyst, but heat from nearby molten rock changed it to the yellow form of quartz. Citrine is known to change color when subjected to heat and is routinely heated in the jewelry-making process to intensify its color. For this same reason, though, this gemstone should not be left in direct sunlight for a long time because it will permanently alter the color. Most Citrine is mined in Brazil, but other sources of the quartz are Bolivia and Madagascar.

A gift of Citrine is symbolic for hope and strength. With its sunny brightness, this gemstone is ideal for helping anyone to get through the tough times in life!

Alternate Birthstone

Yellow Topaz is an alternate gemstone for those born in November. Its golden color was believed by the Egyptians to be the glow cast by the sun god Ra. Yellow Topaz ranges in color from a peachy blush to a deep cognac. A gift of this gemstone is said to symbolize friendship and to strengthen one's capacity to give and receive love.
