President Kelli Wold led the meeting. The agenda followed an email sent by Debra Bailey with items to be discussed.

December meeting will be the end of year/holiday party. There will be a potluck sign-up. Myesa will put together the google sign-up and send to Debbie V. for club distribution so there are no duplicate dishes. There will be a gift exchange, rock related, costs of gift asked to be between \$10-\$15. Kelli would like to play a game at the party, Rock B-I-N-G-O. Robert's Rules of Order

What would we do without the Robert's Rules of Order and our Parliamentarians! I have a lot of admiration for parliamentarians. Our societies, Federations and the AFMS use them as the framework for our meetings.

This famous, "how to run a meeting," rule book was named after Colonel Henry Martyn Robert back in 1876.

Like some of our experiences, Henry was asked at the spur of the moment to lead a meeting for the community. He was well versed for the job since he was an Army Engineer about to lead a meeting concerning local defense. Unfortunately for Henry, a lot of conflict arose during the meeting, and he soon realized he didn't have a clue how to run a meeting efficiently. No one at the meeting knew how to run a meeting either. He swore he would never go through that experience again, and he went to work creating what is now known as Robert's Rules of Order.

Back in 1876 there were rules and practices of conduct for the United States Congress. Robert's Rules of Order are modifications of those rules and practices for organizations like ours to easily run meetings with a spirit of cooperation and a sense of eloquent order.

Since 1876 there have been 12 revised editions, and you can buy the handy Robert's Rules of Order In Brief.

Jason Hammer's Rock Tumbling Presentation

Jason Hammer was our guest speaker at the WDGM&S' November 9th meeting. Jason brought in several items that go along with his passion of "Rock Tumbling". Jason had a table with rocks spread out on it from the different stages of being polished. He brought in a small tumbler to demonstrate the action of tumbling and along with four different grades of polishing media that smooth and polish the rocks. Jason uses a rotating rock tumbler. He explained the difference between a rotating rock tumbler, which rotates and uses the energy of that rotation to grind the rocks and polishing media against each other, and a vibratory tumbler, which uses vibrations to cause the rocks and polishing media to rub against one another.



Jason passed around plastic bowls of rocks which included Bubblegum Agate, Badlands Jasper, Petrified wood, and Prairie Agate. Jason also passed around specimens of rocks and explained why they would not be good for tumbling along with samples of rocks that were being processed in stage one.



Jason emphasized the first stage, using the coarsest polishing media, as being the most important. He explained the coarse grit was the roughest and would remove the most material during the polishing process. It's important to note at this time that each stage in Jason's polishing method may last several weeks coupled with weekly rinsing using clean water and a simple dash of blue dish soap. This soap is important as it helps break the surface tension in the water and prevents any of the polishing media or sand from the rock to adhere to the rocks he intends to polish.

Jason's first stage with the tumbler can last more than seven weeks depending on the hardness of the rock(s) he's polishing. This example was shown in the bowl of rocks labeled "Needs more time in stage 1".

These rocks were beginning to become smooth but had noticeably visible defects in them. Jason further explained that these defects would come out with time and fresh coarse grade polishing media. Jason noted that the more the rocks were tumbled, in an attempt to remove the defects, additional rock would be lost from the specimens that he intended to polish.

Jason then explained that after stage one was completed he would utilize progressively finer polishing medias during stages two through four. Jason further mentioned that each of these stages usually last a week for him but it also depends on the rock(s) he's polishing. He may adjust how long he tumbles the specimens and may even skip a stage if he feels it's unnecessary. Jason then took time to field questions from the group ranging from his use of ceramic polishing media to how he selects rocks in the field to polish. Eighteen members attended the presentation along with seven guests.
